
Secretary Report





Why Should I Have My Engine's Distributor Rebuilt?

After all, the engine starts, it goes down the road, and it doesn't give me much grief. It would be a waste of money. Or would it? Many people that drive older cars with good running or freshly rebuilt engines don't ever consider rebuilding the distributor, especially if it meets the requirements of the opening sentence.

I used to be in that group. The money spent on rebuilding a distributor pays good dividends, in quicker starts, faster acceleration and better economy. The distributor is a very precise built mechanism that is designed to ignite the air fuel mixture in the cylinder at exactly the right time, each and every revolution of the engine. This helps make a well performing engine. Some of the parts that wear are the bushings that support the main shaft, the advance plate with associated components, and the vacuum advance unit. The shaft is held in very close tolerances to the distributor body as it spins. As the bushings wear this effects the gap set at the points. Instead of the gap being fixed, it's now variable as the shaft moves about in the bushings, this changes the timing. The ad-



vance plate, is designed to ride smoothly on a bearing system so the timing can be advanced. Over time these plates may no longer move smoothly, causing the advance of the timing to start late and sometimes limiting full travel, or even become stuck. The vacuum advance is a rubber diaphragm housed in a metal flying saucer shaped housing outside the distributor. With engine vacuum pulling on one side of the diaphragm that moves an arm which is attached to the advance plate. A leak in the diaphragm will disable any influence of the vacuum advance unit.

The list of worn parts in a distributor is long, almost as long as the list of parts that are adjustable, variable or tunable. A properly rebuilt distributor should not only have new parts installed, but should, and most importantly, be 'tuned or dialed in' to the engines specific task. Is the engine stock, and you're just cruising, is it a performance build, burning premium fuel, is it used for towing or supercharged? Each of these engines might have the same looking distributor, but the internal set up for each would be unique. Different advance curve, advance limits, initial or static timing, and vacuum advance influence. Two things I learned, a stock advance curve is irrelevant today because fuel is not the same as it was in the 50's and 60's.

When you have your distributor rebuilt make sure they ask you to fill out a worksheet. Some of the info on the sheet would be, make and year of vehicle, engine size, performance mods, auto or manual trans, gear ratio, fuel, supercharged, the list go on. Then the builder can tune the distributor to your engine. You will truly get the biggest 'bang for your buck'. I have been using Advanced Distributors for a number of years with great success. Jeff is a true pro.
